

# Lewis and Clark Community College Associate of Art Theater Dance- Dance Emphasis

Completion of an Associate in Arts or Science degree at Lewis and Clark Community College fulfills SIUE's general education requirements with the exception of an Interdisciplinary Studies course that all students must take during their junior or senior year at SIUE.

This "Transfer Program Guide" is an *example* of proposed curriculum for students to use while completing their associate's degree. Reading, writing, and math placement could alter the course sequencing and transfer date. Therefore, students should begin sequencing their reading/writing (if applicable) and math & science courses during the first semester, paying particular attention to prerequisites. Students have the option of taking summer classes to lessen fall and spring course loads.

It is highly recommended that students meet with a Lewis and Clark advisor; for additional information please contact the SIUE coordinator for advising and partnership programs in Haskell Hall Rm. B07.

Students must complete 50% or more of SIUE degree requirements at SIUE (120 + hours required for graduation).

Although a minor is not required for students who complete the Bachelor's degree for Theater and Dance: Dance Emphasis, it is suggested that students consider a minor. Courses taken at LCCC to meet LCCC's general education requirements (including electives) can be used for the minor. Students should begin planning early for any of these options. Students who plan to pursue a bachelor of ARTS degree at SIUE will need to complete two semesters of the same foreign language which can be applied for their elective credits for their LCCC degree.

Students are advised to meet on a regular basis with advisors at Lewis and Clark and SIUE. ### Students have 2 options when pursuing a Bachelor's degree in Theater and Dance.

A Bachelor of Arts degree will require 2 semesters of the same foreign language, which can be taken at either LCCC or SIUE, in addition to 8 Humanities and/or Fine Arts Courses (some of which will be completed with the Associate in Arts.)

A Bachelor of Science degree will require completion of 8 courses in life, physical, or social science, in addition to 2 courses with a lab component (all of which will be met with the completion of the Associate in Arts.)

#### **ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS**

A cumulative GPA of 2.0 (on a 4.0 scale) in all college level coursework.

Students must complete 50% or more of SIUE degree requirements at SIUE. (120 +hours required for graduation).

Students seeking admission to the Theater and Dance Department must first be admitted to the University by contacting the Admissions Office. Students who are considering theater and dance as a major should call or visit the department – Dunham Hall, room 1031, telephone 618-650-2773 – as early as possible. They will be referred to a faculty advisor who will provide them more information about the curricula and the department as well as help them plan an academic program. Early advisement will enable students to complete their programs with minimal conflicts and within the shortest possible time



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#### **IMPORTANT STUDENT NOTES:**

### Requirements for students seeking Professional Educator Licensure

Admission to a professional education courses is a joint decision made by the academic discipline in the College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Education Health and Human Behavior. Therefore, it is essential that any student desiring teacher licensure meet with an advisor in the School of Education Health and Human Behavior Student Services for information about admission requirements to courses leading to the professional educator licensure, as soon as they know they would like to pursue this option. Scheduling these required courses involves early and frequent coordination between the student, College of Arts and Sciences Advisor, Department Faculty Mentor, and School of Education Health and Human Behavior Advisor. An overall grade point average of 2.5 is required for admission to the teacher licensure program. CIED 100 is an introductory course that is open to all students interested in pursuing Professional Educator Licensure.

Students seeking Professional Educator Licensure (PEL) must meet specific general education and professional education requirements, and must pass state and licensure tests prior to, during their program, and in order to gain the PEL. State requirements change, and the latest details about these requirements can be found in the <u>School of Education Health and Human Behavior section</u> of the undergraduate academic catalog, the <u>School of Education, Health and Human Behavior website</u> and by making an appointment with a <u>School of Education Health and Human Behavior advisor</u>.
